	Local Food bank	The Foodbank helps vulnerable people by giving them 3 days of emergency food while they find a long term solution. Bloxwich & Blakenall Foodbank / Black Country Food bank	
	Save the Children	A charity that exists to help every child reach their full potential. In over 100 countries, we make sure children stay safe, healthy and keep learning.	
	Captain Sir Thomas Moore	More popularly known as Captain Tom, he was a British Army officer and fundraiser who raised money for charity in the run-up to his 100th birthday during the COVID-19 pandemic.	
	Tony Hudgell	Young boy who has raised money by completing charity walks despite having both his legs amputated.	
	UNICEF	An organisation thats works in more than 190 countries to reach the most disadvantaged children and adolescents – and to protect the rights of every child.	

Key Vocabulary	Definition	
Poverty	Not having enough money for basic needs such as food, drinking water, shelter or toiletries	
Food Bank	A place where stocks of food, typically basic provisions and non-perishable items, are supplied free of charge to people in need.	
Basic Needs	Items necessary for a minimum standard of living	
Waste	Food waste is food that could be eaten but is binned/wasted whether or not it is kept beyond its expiry date	
Charity	The voluntary giving of help, typically in the form of money, to those in need.	
Fairness	Treatment or behaviour where favoritism is not shown.	
Equality	Being equal with rights and opportunities.
